YOUR HELP NEEDED TO ENSURE NSD'S LONG-TERM VITIALITY

Long before I became Newhall's Superintendent, I served the District as Assistant Superintendent (2000 -2005) in charge of instructional services. During that period, Newhall was experiencing phenomenal growth, fueled by what seemed to be 360 degrees of home-building. So many children were coming into our schools that we had to initiate a year-round (multitrack) schedule wherein, at any given time, three fourths of the District's students were in session while the other fourth was "off-track." Many teachers had to share classrooms as they would "rove" to available rooms when some of their colleagues went off on break. The arrangement was complicated and very cumbersome. Still, staff and parents came together to make it all work.

By the time I left Newhall to become Superintendent of the Carpinteria Unified School District, McGrath and Pico Canyon opened, Wiley Canyon and Meadows were modernized and Oak Hills would open soon thereafter. Year-round scheduling, along with its many challenges, went away. Newhall became the Santa Clarita Valley's top performing district and continues to this day, even after the State introduced new standards and assessments. Now, returning to Newhall nearly ten years later, the achievement is still the highest but enrollment has gone in a completely different direction thanks to the lasting effects of the 2008 economic downturn (perhaps better termed the Second Great Depression) and a lower birth rate. Professional demographic studies predict that, for the 2019-20 school year, the District will have 951 fewer students than its current enrollment. By today's State funding amounts, that translates to a revenue loss of just over 6 .487 million dollars. Loss of revenue means loss of staff and loss of programs.

To ensure that Newhall continues to be the SCV's highest performing district, we are pulling out all of the stops to mitigate enrollment loss. First and foremost, we want children who reside within the District boundaries to attend District schools.

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NSD STAYS ON TOP



In spring 2015 NSD students took part in the first state-wide administration of the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP), the new computer-based tests for English language arts and mathematics that replaced the former paper-based California Standards Test for these subjects. These assessments are part of California's comprehensive plan for supporting high-quality learning at every school. They are based on California's new, more challenging academic standards (Common Core State Standards), which are designed to help all students graduate ready for college and to positioned to pursue a career. The CAASPP includes a wider variety of questions than the multiple-choice tests they replaced, requiring students to explain solutions to problems, think critically, and write analytically. These skills take time and effort to master, but our students will need them to succeed in the long run. In the Newhall School District, we see these assessments as an academic checkup. Like class assignments and report cards, the tests are one gauge of student progress one way to provide you and your child's teachers with information about your child's progress toward mastery of grade level standards.

As was the case with the previous State assessments, the Newhall School District significantly outperformed its neighboring school districts. We are very proud of these results, but when we compare the results in English language arts and math, we have work to do in mathematics. To that end, we have launched a concerted effort to improve math instruction across all schools with the support of four District -level Teachers on Special Assignment. These math "coaches" are out at sites modeling lessons, building teachers' content knowledge and providing assistance on how to maximize student engagement in learning mathematical concepts.

With so much academic success, we remember how that success was attained: hard work, diligence, collaboration and a willingness to always do better.

ARTISTS-IN-RESIDENCE BRING OUT THE BEST IN STUDENTS

The Newhall School District has long been a district that offers students far more than an educational program that focuses on the basics. One of the areas that the Governing Board has prided itself on is its focus on arts education. Over the past eight years, NSD has had an art specialist who travels to all ten schools serving primarily 4^{th} and 5^{th} grade students. The program has been a student favorite year-in and year-out. With the onset of the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) that allowed parent and community input into how the District spends Stateallocated funds, the desire to expand the art program rose to the top as a priority for parents as well as for teachers and students. As a result, the Governing Board approved a second full-time art specialist, expanding the visual arts program to include grades 3 and 6, with opportunities to support grades K-2 as well.

So who are these artists-in-residence?

They are Mr. John Fossa and Ms. Wendy Heard. Mr. Fossa hails from Massachusetts, having earned two B.A.s from the University of Massachusetts, one in Elementary Education and one in Social Psychology. He also holds a Master's Degree in Educational Leadership from the California State University, Northridge. Mr. Fossa has a professional background in elementary education in both teaching and administration. Ms. Heard is a Los Angeles native. She earned her B.A. in Studio Art, emphasizing painting, from CSULA. She also holds a Master's Degree in Educational Leadership from Concordia University. Ms. Heard has a professional background in elementary, secondary, and adult education in both teaching and administration.

Both specialists have a passion for teaching art and for supporting the District's implementation of the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). As such, art becomes a key vehicle for teaching the CCSS. For the students, a CCSS-infused art experience is value-added. NSD students are fortunate to be taught by two outstanding teachers.

MEASURE E UPDATE

The Governing Board of the Newhall School District recently approved the purchase of 1,405 computers to be distributed for student use in February 2016. The addition of these new computers will bring the student to computer ratio to two students for every device. This additional technology will be used to support the State testing as well as allow students more time before, during and after school using instructional resources such as Dreambox (for math). Reading A-Z and Type to Learn. The additional time will better prepare students for the State testing as well as increase their understanding of core math and language concepts. The District will be expanding its wireless infrastructure to support the increased number of devices. The technology purchase is funded through the District's Measure E General Obligation Bond.

Other Measure E funded projects currently underway are the replacement of portable classrooms with permanent structures at Old Orchard and Peachland Elementary Schools. The next project to begin is the renovation of the Newhall School Auditorium. The auditorium was built in 1939-1940 and the building had been used as a warehouse for a number of years. The renovation will modernize the building, add restrooms and dressing rooms, expand the stage, add theatrical lights and sound and result in a 531-seat beautiful venue that will be used by all district schools as well as by the community. This project is scheduled for construction beginning in February and will be completed in the 2016-2017 school year.
